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ABOUT OPVRS

Ocean Park Volunteer Rescue Squad is an all-volunteer emergency medical services agency located in Virginia Beach, VA. As one of ten volunteer rescue squads serving the city of Virginia Beach, OPVRS proudly represents the VBRescue system from its home on Shore Drive situated on the Chesapeake Bay in northern Virginia Beach.

OPVRS began as a fire department founded in 1942 at the request of the Ocean Park Civic League. The department was staffed by volunteers of the Ocean Park Men's Club, which later became known as the Ocean Park Volunteer Fire Department. In the 1950's, a used Army field ambulance was purchased and staffed by the Ocean Park Women's Club, allowing the department to provide fire and medical services to the community. The firehouse became the hub of community activity. Events such as scout meetings, dance classes, civic league meetings, women's club meetings, parties and fund raisers were held there. It was a place where parents did not have to worry about their junior firemen. The kids loved it and would spend weekends shining up the trucks and working beside the community's leaders helping people in crisis. It was where neighbors were caring about neighbors.

OUR MISSION

The Ocean Park Volunteer Rescue Squad is composed of volunteers who are dedicated, skilled and compassionate professionals whose mission is to provide the highest level of pre-hospital care while promoting a healthier community through patient care, patient advocacy, education, public service and community involvement.

Today, our volunteers carry on this proud tradition which started more than 80 years ago. The original fire station at 3769 E Stratford Road still serves as the home of OPVRS, now designated Rescue Station 1. Additionally, OPVRS staffs the City of Virginia Beach First Landing Fire and EMS station as a satellite to Rescue Station 1.

Ocean Park Volunteer Rescue Squad's "first due" area stretches along the Shore Drive corridor from First Court Road to the North End and encompasses First Landing State Park, eight miles of coastline and more than ten square miles of the city of Virginia Beach. However, OPVRS personnel and ambulances respond to emergencies across the city of Virginia Beach as part of the VBRescue system.

Emergency responses are provided by Virginia certified Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs), Advanced EMTs, EMT-Intermediates and Paramedics staffing a fleet of four ambulances, one utility truck, one medical ATV and one support van.

2022 proved to be a busy year for Ocean Park volunteers, with a significant increase in calls for service from previous years.


DESCRIPTION OF TERMS

- Calls for service (CFS): a singular event or request for emergency service that generates an EMS incident number regardless of the incident type, where an EMS unit is dispatched or is self-initiated by the first responder.
- Responses: an individual EMS unit responds to a dispatched call for service. Depending on the incident type, the 911 dispatcher may dispatch one or more EMS units. Each unit dispatched and who responded to the call for service is considered a response. In many cases, there are multiple EMS units dispatched to a single call for service.
- **Priority 1**: life-threatening or potentially life-threatening emergencies based on the patient's complaint or mechanism of injury.
- Priority 2: emergency cases not deemed to be life-threatening or potentially life-threatening based on the patient's complaint or mechanism of injury as defined by the Operational Medical Director.
- **Priority 3**: non-emergency requests for assistance.
- Advance Life Support (ALS) Transport: transport with ALS providers on board conducting advanced interventions.
- Basic Life Support (BLS) Transport: transport not requiring pre-hospital advanced life support providers or interventions.

2021-2022 COMPARISON

- OPVRS saw an increase in every category of operational statistics from 2021.
 - o 26% increase in Priority 1 Calls for Service
 - o 52% increase in Priority 2 & 3 Calls for Service
 - o 37% increase in Ambulance Responses
 - o 34% increase in ALS Transports
 - 38% increase in BLS Transports



2022 was a significant year for OPVRS as we replaced three ambulances while simultaneously maintaining our squad owned building, forcing us to dip into our cash reserves. In addition to increased operational expenses, OPVRS will soon replace a fourth ambulance while continuing to maintain and modernize our facilities. The continued financial support of our friends and neighbors is critical to our ability to continue providing quality emergency care.

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MEMBERSHIP AND RECRUITING

OPVRS boasts a diverse membership of over 50 volunteer EMS providers and support team members. Recruiting efforts include visits to the EMT Academy to speak with prospective EMTs, booths and displays at the Shore Drive Farmers Market, and participation in VBRescue recruiting and advertising.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

In addition to the immense amounts of time and energy contributed to day-to-day operations, numerous projects and improvements were completed during a fruitful year for OPVRS.

UTILITY 1 IMPLEMENTATION

While OPVRS has owned Utility 1 since 2019, the unit has seen limited service. This year, OPVRS made a significant investment to better integrate this apparatus into the Emergency Response System.

- The first major upgrade was the addition of a Mobile Data Terminal, or "MDT," which provides the crew with real-time information on active calls for service. Before the addition of the MDT, crews would have to rely on radio dispatches to gather information and respond to calls. Additionally, the MDT enables dispatchers to track Utility 1's location and dispatch it to Cardiac Arrests in the area as a first response unit to deliver high quality CPR and an AED to the scene of the emergency.
- Secondly, updates were made to the equipment on Utility 1 to make it a true "All Hazards" response vehicle. In addition to the medical supplies carried on board, incident command kits, traffic direction equipment, and support supplies were added to make the vehicle more versatile and better prepared to respond to unique and challenging emergencies.





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AMBULANCE REPLACEMENT

Three new Ford F-550 Advanced Life Support Ambulances were delivered in 2022 from Atlantic Emergency Solutions, a Wheeled Coach Dealership. These three units were purchased for a price of \$231,621.36 each totaling a \$694,000 total investment into OPVRS' fleet in 2022. The new units replaced the majority of OPVRS' fleet which consisted of one 2008 International Durastar Horton Ambulance and two 2008 International Durastar Wheeled Coach Ambulances. Delivery of these units was impeded by record-long lead times in receiving new equipment from the factory and record price increases. A fourth Ford F-550 Advanced Life Support ambulance was placed on order this summer with an estimated 30 month lead time. This unit will replace ambulance 123 upon its delivery.



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DONOR STEWARDSHIP

This year, OPVRS leadership successfully completed an agreement with "Network for Good," a state-of-the-art Donor Management tool to better serve our generous donors. This program integrates innovative communication technologies, effective fundraising capabilities, and organized donor data into our organization to better serve the community. Thanks to the Virginia Beach Rescue Squad Foundation, OPVRS is one step closer to becoming the best possible stewards of the donations we're given.

VAN 1 REPLACEMENT GRANT

Van 1 has proven itself to be a unique asset in the VBRESCUE response vehicle fleet. As the only asset of its kind, VAN 1 can carry 15 passengers during mass casualty incidents and for educational, duty, and recreational events. With its age and current mileage, the van is meeting the end of its service life. OPVRS applied for a grant through the Virginia Beach Rescue Squad Foundation to replace this fleet asset and was awarded a total of \$29,000. OPVRS is currently soliciting vendors for the vehicle.



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BUILDING & GROUNDS IMPROVEMENTS

OPVRS proudly serves from the original member-built station at 3769 E Stratford Rd. In order to keep this building operational, comfortable, and modern, significant effort is poured into renovations and improvements.



New VBRescue-Ocean Park signage was installed on the side of Rescue Station 1 to better identify and showcase the home of OPVRS on Shore Drive.



Aging pavement was replaced by new asphalt across the property with the addition of four parking spaces.



Upgrades were made to the station network to improve information and technology services.



The meeting and social hall received fresh paint, floor refurbishment, and additional furniture to better serve both the Rescue Squad and the community organizations that meet here.

2023 AND BEYOND

The future of OPVRS has never been brighter, and we aim to continue the momentum built in 2022 through the coming year and beyond. Our vision includes the goals below.

2023 GOALS

- Continue providing the highest quality of emergency medical care to the community we serve
- Increase operational staffing and strengthen membership through aggressive recruiting and retention
- Build financial security and sustainability through fundraising, investing, and grants
- Modernize Rescue Station 1 through structural and cosmetic improvements
- Establish OPVRS as a regional training source by offering unique and plentiful in-house continuing education

MAJOR INVESTMENTS AND IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS

AMBULANCE 123 REPLACEMENT

Due to rising apparatus prices and long lead times, the replacement for A123 has been ordered at the current vehicle's midlife. The new vehicle is not expected to be delivered and in service until 2025.

VAN 1 REPLACEMENT

After 20 years of service, VAN 1 is set to be replaced in the coming year. VAN 1 is a unique capability that OPVRS brings to the VBRescue system for multi-patient transport during mass casualty incidents.

RESCUE STATION 1 RENOVATIONS

Hand built by the founding members, Rescue Station 1 is rich in history and character but requires significant repairs and modernization. Living space renovations, hazard mitigation and cosmetic improvements are ongoing.


